President Report

It really takes being heard from multiple venues for WorkSafeBC to really understand the impact it is having. Not only on local municipalities, but safety professionals in general. I encourage you to try to be the employer's voice and try to make sure that employers voice is heard. When I say employer's voice, we're always speaking from the standpoint of the employer's voice, the employer's perspective, but so much more important, the workers perspective. Some of the policies and changes and things like that. There's that component of practicability of them and when they're not practical, our workers get stuck in the middle. If the processes don't work and they're not fair and they're not understood, and they get they get caught in the and we really want to update that as much as possible to really encourage that employee's voice aspect as much as we can.

Reflecting on some of the new activities, you'll see a lot of focus on psychological health and safety initiatives. When we look at our base rates and our ERA we're definitely getting an increase in those which is causing more citizen money to be paid to WorkSafeBC.

CEO Report

Operations

#JAC2023

PWABC and BCMSA have contracted the services of Venue West to support JAC2023. Registration for both Sponsors/Exhibitors and Delegates is now open. Unfortunately, registrations are significantly lower than seen in previous years. Sponsor/Exhibitor registration is only 69% sold out (was sold out at this time in 2019) and delegate registration is 77% sold out (was 81% sold out in 2019).

Based on final outcomes including last minute registrations the Associations post pandemic conference strategies may need to be revisited.

To maintain levels of service to our membership reduced levels of BCMSA will be attending the conference this year and as such we hope to more heavily rely on our BOD volunteers to support the event.

2024-2026 Partnership Agreement with PWABC

The partnership agreement between BCMSA and PWABC is fully executed with the understanding that each event will have a separate MOU to dictate the effort and financial commitments of both parties.

A soft hold has been placed on the Penticton Trade and Convention Centre as the hosting location for 2024 and 2026's JAC. An RFP is underway to identify other potential locations for the 2025 JAC.

Director of Programs and Initiatives Report

Training

The BCMSA has booked 1580 courses (virtual and in-person) thus far in 2023. We currently have 11% more courses booked this year than we did at this time in 2022.

BCMSA has included two need refresher courses with SPI:

- Fall Protection (half day refresher),
- Confined Space Attendant/Entry Supervisor (1-day refresher)
 - These courses will be up and ready to go in October 2023

CMHA is developing a Burnout course which will have a municipal focus. This course is in the development stage and the BCMSA hopes to release this in the fall.

Driver Training - Thinking Driver

BCMSA has partnered with Thinking Driver to offer 7 new safety driver courses for the municipal sector. Amongst these include are:

- Driver Training: Hazard Avoidance Training for Municipal Drivers
- Driver Training: Safe Backing Course for Municipal Drivers
- Driver Training: Light Duty Utility Trailer Towing Course for Municipal Drivers



- Driver Training: Heavy Duty Trailer Towing Course for Municipal Drivers
- Driver Training: Winch Safety for Municipal Drivers
- Driver Training: Four-Wheel Drive Safe Operation for Municipal Drivers
- Driver Training: Vehicle Orientation and Quality Assurance Check for Municipal Drivers

E-Learning

CMHA

BCMSA is working with CMHA to develop awareness courses into E-learning format for the fall. This project is in the early stages, but we are hopeful to offer this after the summer.

Due Diligence for Supervisors

BCMSA is working with AMSHA on revising the Due Diligence for Supervisors course. This revamped course will be complete in Q4 of 2023.

Psychological Health and Safety

BCMSA has partnered with MWH to develop the PH&S Manager Certificate into E-learning format. The development has begin and the first course will be launched in September will be:

BCMSA hosted it's first ever open enrollment session for RM TTT in Langley on June 26-28, 2023 and the Association envisions running similar workshops like this in the future.

HSA/COR Workplans and Budgets

BCMSA has created and submitted the preliminary HSA/COR Workplans and Budgets to WorkSafeBC. The workplans and budgets will be signed off at the BOD meeting and submitted for approval after the conference.

LGMA Conference

BCMSA presented at the LGMA conference on June 15, 2023, on investing in Workplace Health and Safety for Local Government Sustainability. The presentation focused on how the Association uses data analytics to make informed decision and had a good turnout of Senior Leaders within the municipal sector and was also well received.

Letters of Communication

Letters of communication were sent to three different categories this year.



- 1. Organizations who remain on the list, total 10. This identifies organizations who have an Experience Rating of 30% and above. The letter identifies their standing and how the BCMSA can further support them through training, resources, and engagement project.
- 2. Organizations with improved performance (8). The letter congratulates them on their hard work and encourages them to continue the valuable work being done.
- 3. Organizations new to the list (1). The letter identifies their performance compared to a like sized organization and cost savings.

Any organizations who are new or remain on the list and meet the criteria of the Engagement Project are offered to the opportunity to participate.

September-First Aid, Psychological Health and Safety: Checking-In





COR

WorkSafeBC Certifying Partner Audit

WorkSafeBC conducted a CP Audit for the BCMSA from June 19-23, 2023. The audit included looking at the Association's fiscal management, documentation management, operational management and accuracy of reporting all in relation to the COR program (among other variables). The BCMSA is proud to report back that the Association passed on all accounts and did extremely well in the CP audit. There are no areas of concern in the BCMSA managing the COR program for local government and naturally aligned organizations.

Internal Auditor Training

The Association ran it's 2nd Internal Auditor Training session on June 7 and 8 at the BCMSA office. The third Internal Auditor Training session will be held on October 17 and 18 at the BCMSA office. This will be a hybrid event so students can access the training virtually as well. We currently have 9 spots left for registration.

COR Benchmarking Reports

With the onset of our COR dashboard, the BCMSA has utilized this program to develop COR Benchmarking reports for COR certified municipalities. Each municipality will receive a report once their audit has been completed which will allow them to compare their results with like minded associations as well as compare their results with internal previous years scores. This report will give organizations valuable information which they use to better their safety management system and processes.

COR Audit Tool(s) for Naturally Aligned Organizations

BCMSA is currently working with CSSHSA and Safe Care BC on developing sector specific audit tools for their industry. This will allow for a more efficient audit for all sectors involved whom audit within the BCMSA scope. The Association plans on having the new tools developed and in use for the Internal Auditor course in October.
